Why Philosophy?

Philosophy is the arena in which we make sense of our experience, figure ourselves out and develop a worldview. It awakens our puzzlement and curiosity, grabbing our attention and inviting a response.

Abraham Heschel suggested that philosophy is 'the art of asking the right questions' – questions such as:

What makes something fair? Is honoring someone and respecting them the same thing?

What do we mean when we say something is a miracle?



Philosophy and Children

Philosophy taps children's natural curiosity and engages them in a search for meaning. In general education, *Philosophy for Children* is recognized as the leading approach to bringing philosophical inquiry into the classroom.* *Based around creating communities of inquiry,* participants' engagement in meaning-making is integrated with deep attention to building reflective, creative and caring community.

This makes it particularly relevant to Jewish education.
